COURSE NEWS

The course is in great condition at the moment & thanks go to all involved in that process. Upkeep of the course has not been easy in the last few weeks with the weather being so hot, it is a credit to all the volunteers who give up a day or three a week to keep water up to the greens and mow the course.

The Ladies' 10th Tee levelling has been completed and the Ladies are playing off this tee once again. Thanks to Taff and all who helped on this project.

UPCOMING EVENTS

Saturday 2 February will be Monthly Medal day.

Saturday 9 February will feature a new format, for us anyway, a 4 Player Las Vegas Stableford style game where teams of two players are chosen and a team score is calculated on each hole. The golfers' scores for each hole are paired up for a combined score. For example, if player A gets a 4 and player B gets a 6, the team score is 46 (the lower number goes first). If both players get a 5, then the team score is 55; if one shoots a 7 and the other a 3, then the team score is 37. Points are accumulated during the round with the team with the lowest score being the winner.

Saturday 16 February will be the Annual Red Tees Plate event. As the name suggests we all play off the Ladies' Tees for this Honour Board event. Handicap incentives are given for dressing up! A great effort was made last year.









The first Saturday in March, the 2nd, will be Monthly Medal as usual.

Saturday 9 March will be a 3 Ball Ambrose. This season will be a trial run for the playing of a less individual style of event every second Saturday of the month. If all have enjoyed this break from traditional Stableford/Stroke/Par events this will be continued into next season as well.

Sunday 10 March will be a Sunday Stableford event as this is the Labour Day Long Weekend.

Monday 11 March is Labour Day and a Stableford event will be played.

Saturday 16 March will be a 4BBB Matchplay round



EAGLE'S NEST

THE DUTIES OF THE MARKER IN A COMPETITION

You are most likely to have a marker, or to serve as one, during a tournament or competition. What are the duties of a marker? If you are serving as a marker for another golfer, you should:

- Observe, as best you can, each stroke the golfer plays;
- Count those strokes, plus any penalty strokes that may be necessary to add;
- Double-check the score with the golfer after each hole (this is not *required*, but is strongly recommended) and write it down;
- Total and sign the scorecard at the end of the round;
- Hand the scorecard back to the golfer.

Making sure the scores on the card are correct is the obligation of the golfer, who should check and sign his or her scorecard after the marker has done so. The marker, even if it is another golfer, is not subject to penalty if there are any good-faith mistakes on the scorecard.

However, if the marker *knowingly* writes down an incorrect score, or *knowingly* attests (by signing the card) to an incorrect score, the marker (if it's a fellow-competitor) will also be disqualified. And if that marker is not a golfer, it's doubtful the Committee would ever again make use of that individual.

If the marker and the player disagree about a hole score, the marker can decline to sign the scorecard. In that case, the Committee would have to speak to both the marker and golfer and make a ruling.

NEW YEAR, NEW RULES

(Extract from 26 January 2019 Golf Australia Newsletter)

Complaints. Praise. Confusion. Plaudits. We've had it all in the first two weeks of the new Rules of Golf.

And as anyone in the rules department of Golf Australia will attest, there's been no shortage of feedback on the modernisation process implemented on 1 January. But overall, the reaction has been positive as it has helped to speed up the game.

So let's get down to the nuts and bolts of the changes...

The Rules authority kept the following two principles at the heart of the changes:

- 1. Playing the ball as it lies AND playing the course as you find it
- 2. Finding solutions to help speed up the game

While the Australian golf community has generally embraced the changes with open arms, there has been some confusion as to what is right and wrong on the golf course. Here's our broad take on some of the most topical matters...

Flagstick

Many groups are finding they have differing views on whether they should keep the flagstick in the hole. While this change was aimed at speeding up play, and in most instances working well, there are times when different players within a group will want the flag left in, or removed, and this is also dependent on the length of putt. Therefore, we advise golfers to be vigilant to the needs of others.

Knee Height Drop

The biggest "habitual" change most players have encountered is dropping the ball from knee height. Many have queried as to why the initial dropping height of "just above the ground" wasn't adopted, or why it isn't "knee height or above". To the former, the response is that it wouldn't do that game any favours to see people lying down trying to get drop their ball from a height so close to the ground that they appear to be placing; to the latter, the response is that dropping from any higher than knee height may enhance likelihood for a re-drop because of a bigger bounce, thus slowing down the process. Knee height aims to reduce the amount of drops necessary to keep the ball in the relief area.

Penalty Areas

Not only have these gone through a name change, you are also now permitted to ground your club and move loose impediments while in there. This has been a very welcome change for those new to the game but has been a little bit harder to get used to for the more skilled, as they are finally being able to feast on once forbidden fruit, but still in the mind-set, that mightn't be morally right. Breathe easy, everything is OK!

Bunkers

"What do you mean I can move loose impediments in a bunker, but I can't ground my club when addressing the ball?" This has created the most confusion as many had heard the restriction on grounding your club had been removed. This is not the case, but it has been loosened. You are only penalised if you ground your club immediately in front of, or right behind the ball, or in a backswing or practice swing. Testing, most definitely remains a no-no.

JUNIOR GOLF

We frequently have opportunities for Juniors to come up and play, practice, learn or compete in our fine game of golf. We are very lucky to have 2 volunteers who put together this Junior Program, in Liz Harvey and Ben Charlton. We also have access to a Golf Professional in Michael Skinner who comes over at least twice a year to coach both adults and the juniors.
